

Key Challenges and Obstacles Affecting the Live Release Rate

- High call volume and resource limitations
- High-volume shelter intake
- Public interaction and community perception
- Operational and equipment constraints
- Staff retention and workforce challenges





Canine Distemper Virus (CDV)

- Highly contagious viral disease affecting dogs and some wildlife (e.g., raccoons, foxes, skunks).
- Spread by infected wildlife (raccoons, skunks, possums, coyotes)
 - Wildlife is more prevalent in neighborhoods due to encroachment into their habitat
 - Can be combatted by vaccinating pets and using wildlife deterrents to keep them off property
 - Spreads via airborne particles (sneezing, coughing), direct contact with infected animals, and contaminated environments
- In domestic dogs, mortality rate is 50% in adults and 80% in puppies
- · High number of unvaccinated owner surrenders and strays coming into the shelter
- Carried and spread by animals that appear healthy in early stages
- Extremely risky in shelter environments due to close quarters




Timeline

- 3/21 A suspect animal returned with a positive result for Distemper from routine testing.
- 3/24 The North Animal Campus closed to the public to conduct further testing, and the Silcox Campus began surveillance testing.
- 3/24 The public was informed through news releases (to media partners), City News, social media, and the FWACC website. Updates included details on the shelter closure, the initial positive distemper case, and the plan to contain its spread.
- 3/27 Communications were updated to include the closure of the Silcox Animal Campus. Additionally, interviews were conducted with four news outlets to provide updates.
- 74 distemper positive results out of 1,486 tests performed (as of 4/14/2025)
 - + (1) racoon

Mobile Spay/Neuter/Vax Initiative

A community-driven mobile clinic designed to deliver free spay and neuter surgeries and vaccinations directly to underserved and low-income neighborhoods

Animal Shelter Advisory Committee


Proposed expansion of Committee from 7 to 9 members

- Increase in representation with two additional members (additional veterinarian and representative from nonprofit organization)
- Increased frequency of meetings from 3 to 4 times per year
- Broader range of perspectives and expertise
- Potential to address more diverse community needs and issues
- Enhanced decision-making with more voices at the table
- Strengthened committee dynamics through new collaborations
- Broader network and connections: More members can help establish stronger connections with different city stakeholders

- \$59,000,000 estimated cost
- 45,000 sq ft
- Replace existing Silcox facility
- Layout and design to allow for expansion with growing pet population
- New building to provide best practices standard of care for the animals
